Project Background	Humility has been a topic of interest for philosophers and religious practitioners for many years. More recently, social and positive psychologists have also begun studying it.  The aim of this Special Topics in Psychology course is to broadly explore humility through psychological research. It will cover topics such as historical roots of humility, conceptualization and measurement of humility, and contemporary research on humility.  It will be a seminar style course, where students will be assigned weekly readings (2-3 articles), a weekly written assignment (no more than 300 words), 2.5-hour weekly meetings in person to discuss the readings, and a final paper, which could be written in the form of a research proposal (no more than 3000 words).  The idea is that as students are learning about humility, they begin to form their own research questions, culminating in their own research project. Students may also be invited to contribute to ongoing research (e.g., code/analyze data, write papers, present findings at conferences) conducted by the supervisor.
